



TOWN CLERK- The Town Office will be closed Monday, May 26th in observance of Memorial Day.

🌸 The final budget workshop will be held at the regularly-scheduled Select Board meeting on May 8th. Please remember we welcome community members to our public Select Board/Budget workshop.

🌸 In 2023, the legislature mandated that the Bureau of Motor Vehicles (BMV) replace all chickadee plates starting May 1, 2025. Chickadee plates have aged, entered various states of disrepair, and lost their reflectivity. Over a single year, 1,200,000 chickadee plates, which is 71% of all license plates in Maine, will be replaced by Pine Tree or No Tree license plates. Please be aware, if you do have chickadee plates and don't mind getting the new plates, you will not be able to register in advance. Please be sure you come in the month your registration expires as we have limited inventory. If you have reserved your plate, please be sure you bring the letter from the State and your new plates to process your registration in the month your registration is due. We cannot process your registration without both items.

🌸 Absentee ballots for Municipal and RSU elections will be available at the Town Office starting May 12th.

🌸 The current transfer station passes are good through June 30, 2025. New stickers will be available beginning of June. If you have punch cards with punches left to use, they do not expire. Passes cost \$1 and punch cards \$25. Both the pass and the punch card are required when attending the Transfer Station. If you have questions, please call the Town Office at (207) 963-5589.

VETERANS’ COMMITTEE- The next meeting of the Gouldsboro Veterans’ Committee will be on Tuesday, May 6th at 1PM in the meeting room of the town office. We will be finalizing the Memorial Day plans and discussing the summer raffle. This committee recognizes the passing of a local veteran, Linwood Koehling. We salute him for his service to our country and community.

2025 MEMORIAL DAY CEREMONY- The Town of Gouldsboro’s Memorial Day Ceremony will take place on Memorial Day, 26th of May 2025, at 10:30AM. The ceremony will be held at the Gouldsboro Veterans’ Memorial at the Prospect Harbor Women’s Club next to the Town Office. If inclement weather, the service will be held inside the building. The speaker will be Gouldsboro resident Beth Parks. Everyone is welcome to attend and be part of remembering our fallen veterans.

SCHOODIC FOOD PANTRY- We are grateful to the Gouldsboro and Winter Harbor Town Offices, Winter Harbor Provisions, Mc’s Market, Steuben Country Store and Young’s Market for featuring our donation canisters prominently on their counters. The newest businesses to welcome our canisters are the Milbridge House in Milbridge and TunkJoy Bakery in Steuben, which also has a food collection basket. We support them and hope you will too.

Stamp out Hunger – Annually, the second Saturday in May, the National Association of letter carriers and their postal customers participate in the NALC Stamp Out Hunger Food Drive- the largest one-day food drive in the nation. Since inception 30 years ago, this initiative has collected and donated nearly two billion pounds of food. This year, the food drive takes place on Saturday, May 10th, 2025. The post offices of Prospect Harbor, Corea, Birch Harbor, and Gouldsboro have graciously agreed to partner with the Schoodic Food Pantry for the first time to collect non-perishable food donations on May 10th. All donations will stay in our community! (The Winter Harbor Post Office staff is on vacation as of the submission dead line - TBD.) If you have a PO Box, plastic donation bags will be available starting May 3rd to place a donation in and return to your post office. If you receive your mail at home, you are welcome to put your donation in any plastic bag and either hang it from your mailbox, place it inside your box or on the ground next to the box, post office by 9AM on May 10th or bring it to your local post office. By using plastic bags, we hope to keep any donations dry. If you wish to donate, please remember non-perishable, no glass, check expiration dates, & new and sealed personal care items are welcome too! No matter how small or large, your donations will be greatly appreciated. Volunteers from the Schoodic Food Pantry will collect the donations from your local post offices and deliver directly to the food pantry.

COASTAL RESILIENCE- Gouldsboro’s Coastal Resilience Committee will convene a meeting in the Peninsula School cafeteria on Saturday, May 17th at 1PM to consider how to make the town’s working waterfront property in Prospect Harbor, Bunkers Harbor, and South Gouldsboro more resistant to sea-level rise and severe storms and more useful to fishermen and other users. The town will use input from this meeting to begin a study of the cost and feasibility of improvements to the town’s waterfront infrastructure in these harbors. Safe Disposal of Sharps

Why It's Important

Needle stick injuries
are a serious public health risk,
causing great stress to victims
and costing thousands
of dollars for medical testing.

Each year thousands of Mainers use millions of needles and lancets or “sharps” as part of their routine for controlling medical conditions such as diabetes, arthritis, severe allergies and migraines. Improper disposal of these sharps into household or workplace trash or by flushing them down the toilet puts you and your family, janitorial and solid waste staff, and the general public at risk for accidental needle sticks. Needle stick injuries are a serious public health risk because of the potential for transmission of blood-borne diseases such as Hepatitis B and HIV/AIDS.

*Simply recapping a syringe is **not** enough to protect against needle sticks.*

- Lancets
- Infusion sets

Proper Disposal of Household Sharps in the State of Maine



What Should I Do With My Used Sharps?

Proper Containment and Disposal Practices

Handling Sharps at Home

Place used syringes, pen needles, lancets and other sharps in rigid containers resistant to leaks and punctures. **Label filled containers "DO NOT RECYCLE."**



Needle Clipping Devices

Devices that clip the needle off of a syringe allow you to throw the remaining piece in your household trash. Wrap the full device in heavy-duty tape and dispose in your trash.

Commercially Available & Mail-Back Sharps Containers

Filled commercial sharps containers (like the ones seen here) may be placed with household trash. Mail-back containers are designed to be filled and mailed to the manufacturer or manufacturer's disposal partner for proper disposal. While sharps containers may be available for purchase at your local pharmacy, some manufacturers may also provide containers free of charge through patient support programs (registration may be required). Contact the manufacturer for details.

Household Sharps Containers

Make your own sharps container using a heavy plastic bottle with a screw-on cap such as an old liquid laundry soap bottle. Seal with heavy-duty tape **and label** before disposing in your trash.

Getting Rid of the Waste

Local Hospitals

Some hospitals may accept used household sharps and dispose of them as part of their waste stream. Contact the Environmental Services Department at your local hospital for more information.

When You Are Away From Home

All Maine Turnpike Authority rest stops, some Maine airports and some retail stores have sharps disposal boxes for use while you are away from home.

Loose syringes, lancets, and other sharps should never be thrown in the trash.

Please Don't...

- Throw loose sharps into the trash or toilet.
- Leave sharps anywhere they could injure someone.
- Store used sharps in glass bottles, soda bottles, milk jugs, aluminum cans, coffee cans, or plastic bags.
- Put containers of used sharps in with recycling.

Proper disposal means:

- ✓ Clipping needles **OR**
- ✓ Placing sharps in proper containers
- ✓ Labeling containers **"DO NOT RECYCLE"**
- ✓ Using heavy-duty tape to secure container lids

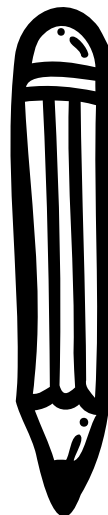
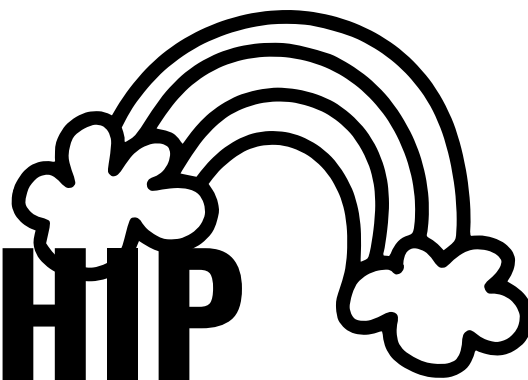
